



## Facility Hazard Inspection 29 CFR 1910 and 1926 OSHA Compliance Onsite – up to 6 hours

The Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 (OSH Act) was passed to prevent workers from being killed or otherwise harmed at work. The law requires employers to provide their employees with working conditions that are free of known dangers. The OSH Act created the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), which sets and enforces protective workplace safety and health standards. This law also gives workers important rights to participate in activities to ensure their protection from job hazards.

## **Summary**

The facility hazard assessment will be a one day (up to 6 hours) visual inspection of all buildings, suites or storage spaces located at your site. If inspection cannot be completed in one day, additional days may be added to written contract/proposal.

A completed written report outlining areas of non-compliance will be provided. Best practices will be identified and labeled, as such.

A conference call, if needed, will be used to review and answer any questions on any line items in the written report after you receive it.

## **Purpose**

To assist companies in a health and safety facility hazard inspection and corrective action initiatives under OSHA Standards for 29 CFR 1910 and 1926 in the workplace.

- A list of OSHA findings and suggested corrective action
- A list of training topics that apply to findings
- A list of recommendations for engineering and administrative controls, if applicable to findings
- A list of weekly, monthly and annual inspections applicable to findings
